Why Blended Learning?

First Aid courses include a theory component and a practical assessment. The **Practical** is **always** completed in class with a trainer. **Blended Learning** allows students to complete the theory online.

What is the eLearning platform?

At New Futures Training we use the **COBA** online eLearning platform.

COBA is **not** like a Zoom session; you complete it independently and **at your own pace**; meaning you can log in and out as many times as you need and it always saves your progress.

COBA is delivered through a series of animations and videos which provide all the information for the multiple-choice questions that follow.

How do I access it?

The COBA module opens one week before the practical assessment. At that time, we email students a link to the portal and instructions on completing your course.

What does COBA look like?


Each unit in the course included a video or animation with a number of multiple-choice questions.


